- I wanted to add a couple more plants for Linda to consider to outcompete buck thorn. Last night I mentioned staghorn sumac and black chokeberry. I would add both silky and gray dogwood to that list, as well.
- Fran asked about lily of the valley and foxglove. [This is a great article on managing Lily of the Valley](#), which we do not consider invasive. It is a colonizer but not invasive. Foxglove is a native plant, so it's not invasive.
- Someone asked about an herbicide to use for cut-stem or stump treatment. The two ingredients used for this are glyphosate and triclopyr. [The MNAP website](#) has information on which herbicides to use for specific plants.
- The picture of a cut honeysuckle stem that was sent to me is definitely an invasive species of honeysuckle.
